PURPOSE OF THE CLASS

Each unit of study will have specific learning targets or goals that are tied to essential outcomes of state standards. These learning targets will be the knowledge and skills that students will be expected to gain. Students will learn the rights and responsibilities of U.S. citizens as well as develop historical think-

ing skills. These skills include: recall—history is what we choose to remember about the past; interpret—history involves explaining people and events; apply—use what we know about the past to understand the present; analyze—history involves figuring out complicated situations; synthesize—history in-

volves making sense out of a jumble of facts; and **evaluate**—history involves making judgments about the past. History education helps students become better thinkers about the world around them. Studying American history helps prepare our students to become active and educated citizens in our democracy.
